2 We celebrate with you this new venture as the north and south conferences  
3 in Indiana become one. May God richly bless that uniting. Congregations  
4 and individuals within both the Indiana and Kentucky conferences of the United Methodist  
5 Church continue to be prime supporters of Church World Service through the Blankets+  
6 Program, the Kit Program, community-wide CROP Hunger Walks, One Great Hour of Sharing  
7 offerings, and in other ways as they witness in their communities on behalf of our program.  
8 More than \$1 million was raised throughout Indiana and Kentucky through these efforts.

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10 CROP Hunger Walks continue to be a strong foundation in our fund-raising efforts. During the  
11 2007-08 fiscal year, there were 29 CROP Hunger Walks plus one Canvass-by-Mail and one  
12 Friendship Farm in Indiana and Kentucky, raising more than \$473,200. The region doubled its  
13 online giving over the previous fiscal year, raising more than \$25,000 electronically. For the  
14 current fiscal year, 30 Walks have been held (four of them new events), in addition to the  
15 Canvass and Farm with total income of more than \$450,000. For 2009-10, plans are in place  
16 for continuing 30 Walks, reviving 1 Walk, and starting 7 new ones (including our first joint Ohio-  
17 Kentucky Walk in the Covington/Newport/Cincinnati area)!

19 The Tools and Blanket Program underwent a face-lift last fall, rebirthing as the Blankets+  
20 Program. Be sure to pick up the new Congregational Kit from the CWS display to assist in  
21 planning your next emphasis for this valuable program. During the last fiscal year, \$119,600  
22 was raised to help build lives in more than 80 countries. Twenty Caring Community banners  
23 were sent to the top ten churches in Indiana and in Kentucky. Maple Grove United Methodist  
24 (Auburn) was #1 in Indiana, earning their 14<sup>th</sup> banner with an average \$53 per their 20 attending  
25 members. Old Union Christian in Lexington, Kentucky, was #1 for that state, earning their 11<sup>th</sup>  
26 banner with an average of \$25.83 per its 80 members. Mentone UMC was #4 earning their first  
27 banner with an average of \$19.39 per attending member. No other UMC churches made it into  
28 the top ten in either state for 2008. Thank you to all who bring this important program to your  
29 congregation. These funds help provide thousands of families with such diverse resources as  
30 woolen and lightweight blankets (including baby blankets), antibacterial hand and face wipes,  
31 large plastic water jugs and buckets, generators, animals, vegetable seeds, canned meat, wells,  
32 irrigation systems, life skills training, and leadership development support.

34 The goal for our 2007-08 Regional CWS Kit program was to generate 3,000 School Kits.  
35 Though we were just a little short on a couple items, we were able to assemble and ship 2,803  
36 School Kits thanks to the generous efforts of 200 groups and volunteers from Indiana and  
37 Kentucky. The Indiana Women’s Prison, under the leadership of Chaplain Catherine Bowie  
38 accepted the challenge of sewing 350 school bags for us. Much of the support for this program  
39 comes from UMC churches through their partnership with Church Women United.

41 During 2008, School Kits were shipped to Bosnia, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Ethiopia, Kenya,  
42 Liberia, Malawi, Moldova, Mongolia, Peru, Sierra Leone, Syria, Zimbabwe, and the United  
43 States (Alaska, Iowa, Louisiana, Maine, Texas, and Wisconsin). Thank you for helping to make  
44 this possible.

46 We have just completed our 2008-09 Kit Program collecting resources for 3,000 Hygiene Kits.  
47 They were assembled in Indianapolis during May. Visit the Church World Service display for a  
48 final report of this effort. Baby Kits will be the focus for 2009-10, with a goal of 1,000 of this new  
49 kit for our efforts; pledge forms are available now!

1 Each Advent, more and more congregations are discovering the wonderful Alternative  
2 Markets/Fairs which offer their members a way to provide gifts rooted in messages of help and  
3 hope while at the same time lessening the materialism of the season. Packets are available to  
4 help you organize this great giving opportunity.

6 Opportunities abound to help around the world, and around the corner. As you plan your  
7 congregation's mission projects, I hope you include Church World Service. Helping to organize  
8 a CROP Hunger Walk in your community), spreading the word about the CWS Regional Kit  
9 program, encouraging Alternative Fairs, and inviting Rev. Judy Dunson to speak at one of your  
10 gatherings are ways to do this. Rev. Dunson spent several weeks in December visiting CWS-  
11 supported programs in the West Bank/Jerusalem, Jordan, and Egypt. She offers a "Sunday  
12 morning package" of sermon, children's message, Sunday school class, and after-church dinner  
13 program as an effective way to tell the Church World Service story.

15 Joe Smith (Elkhart) and Perry Richards (Shelbyville) have ably represented the Indiana Area  
16 UMC on the CWS Regional Advisory Board. Other United Methodists who serve on the Board  
17 are Dan Gangler, Director of Communications, Joyce Ancil (Russiaville representing Church  
18 Women United), Hazel Clark (Indianapolis), Rita Gaither-Gant (Indianapolis), John Gaus  
19 (Bloomington), Duane Loos (Sunman), and Brian White (Columbus). Thank you for being part
